He attended and completed the Part-Time Police Academy in the State 30 of Massachusetts and for a period of time worked as a Part-Time Police Officer for the Hardwick, Massachusetts 31 Police Department.

- 33 Nicholas McPhee currently resides in Pelham, New Hampshire. Nicholas is a graduate of Salem, New
- 34 Hampshire High School and is a veteran of the United States Air Force National Guard, having served in the 35 Fire Protection field. In 2014 Nicholas deployed to Kuwait in support of Operation Enduring Freedom

## a. George "Bill" Burton, Forest Committee

On behalf of the Board of Selectmen, Chairman Le Doux presented George "Bill" Burton with a Certificate of
 Appreciation for his continued service and dedication on the Forest Committee. Bill joined the committee in

49 1981 and is resigning after thirty-seven years. Additionally, Bill joined the Hollis Fire Department in 1958 and

50 retired as Deputy Chief in 2008. He still remains as a volunteer auxiliary member with the Hollis Fire 51 Department. Chairman Le Doux thanked him for his dedicated service to the Town of Hollis. 52 53 3. Committee Appointment Interview 54 a. Joe Brulotte, Forest Committee, Regular Member (term exp. 4/30/21) 55 Joe moved to Hollis and joined the Hollis Fire Department in 1983. He has been the Treasurer of the Hollis 56 Fireman's Association for the past twenty years. Joe was recommended by the Forest Committee to fill the 57 newly vacant position. 58 59 MOVED by Peter Band, seconded by Frank Cadwell that the Selectmen approve Joseph 60 Brulotte to fill an open Regular position on the Hollis Forest Committee, with a term expiration 61 date of 4/30/21. Voting in favor of the motion were Le Doux, Band, Petry and Cadwell. No one 62 was opposed. The motion PASSED 4-0-0. 63 64 4. Memorial Day Coordinator 65 After serving as the Memorial Day Coordinator for quite some time, Jim Belanger stated that he is planning to 66 resign in approximately two years. He recommended Al Fulchino to fill his position when he resigns. Al 67 Fulchino and Dave Sullivan have volunteered to help with the ceremony this year. J. Belanger created a 68 Standard Operating Procedure for the position, noting that the town funds \$1,000 which helps cover expenses 69 such as flags and flowers for all of the cemeteries in town. 70 71 Chairman Le Doux suggested that the Selectmen appoint Mr. Fulchino as an Assistant Memorial Day 72 Coordinator with David Sullivan as an alternate. Both positions are temporary for the purpose of learning how 73 to coordinate the event when J. Belanger resigns. 74 75 MOVED by Mark Le Doux, seconded by Frank Cadwell that the Selectmen appoint Al Fulchino 76 as an Assistant Memorial Day Coordinator, on a temporary basis. Voting in favor of the 77 motion were Le Doux, Band, Petry and Cadwell. No one was opposed. The motion PASSED 4-78 *0-0*. 79 80 MOVED by Mark Le Doux, seconded by Frank Cadwell that the Selectmen appoint Dave 81 Sullivan as an alternate Assistant Memorial Day Coordinator, on a temporary basis. Voting in 82 favor of the motion were Le Doux, Band, Petry and Cadwell. No one was opposed. The motion 83 PASSED 4-0-0. 84 85 The Board agreed to review the Standard Operating Procedure for the Memorial Day Coordinator at the next 86 Selectmen meeting. The manuscript includes the authorization to spend funds. 87 88 5. Energy Committee Presentation 89 a. **Project Update** 90 Hollis Energy Committee (HEC) Chairman, Eric Ryherd presented a slideshow to the Selectmen which included 91 the committee's purpose, accomplishments in 2017 and upcoming plans for 2018. It was reported that there are 92 two solar PV on the Hollis Upper Elementary School and Hollis Primary School. There is also a solar powered

94 provide outreach campaigns. The committee utilizes the PortfolioManager, which is an energy tracking 95 database, managed by Energy Star. The database provides an analysis of actual energy costs oppose to

scoreboard at the Hollis Brookline High School, which saved the taxpayers \$7,000. The committee continues to

96 estimates.

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98 It was reported that the annual electrical savings since 2012 were approximately \$140,000 mainly due to CFL

99 light upgrades to town buildings as well as negotiated energy rates. This amount does not figure in the solar 100 data from the two schools since the savings haven't yet been calculated. The annual heat energy savings since

101 2015 were approximately \$12,500, which is mainly from the wood pellet boiler system. The overall annual

saving is approximately \$152,000. The plans for 2018 were presented, including reviewing and tracking the

- 103 efficiency improvements at the two schools, continuing to collect data via PortfolioManager, reviewing audit
- 104 reports, outreach campaigns, and street lighting upgrades.
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Chairman Le Doux would like the new DPW Director and other personnel to be a part of the Energy Committeeto help balance the membership between the experts and town personnel.

- 108 109 D. Petry requested that the committee move their meeting dates, so P. Band could attend. The Hollis Energy 110 Committee currently holds their regular meetings on the first Monday of the month, which can conflict with 111 Selectmen meetings. D. Petry mentioned that the committee may need to consider changing the meeting time 112 when town personnel join the group. He would also like to see the operational and maintenance costs associated 113 with the projects, in order to have the full picture of the project.
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115 It was noted that solar panels are typically warranted for 25 years. 116

## 6. Heritage Commission Project Update

Heritage Commission Chairman, Dave Sullivan reported that the commission will be considering alternative 118 119 plans for the Cooper Shop. The commission is working on educational story boards, similar to the ones in the 120 Lawrence Barn. The boards will provide the history and uses of the Gabrel Barn and Ice House. The boards 121 will either be hung on the inside or outside of the structures. D. Sullivan reported that the Heritage Commission 122 received a sleigh from the Woods and Lingley families, specifically Elizabeth Woods and her brother Laurie 123 Lingley. The sleigh is completely original, including the paint and pinstriping. It has a painting of the "Sons of 124 Liberty" shield on the back, with a date of 1787. It was stated that although research will need to be completed, 125 it was believed that there was a connection to Prudence Wright, a local female hero in Revolutionary time. Once the research is complete, there will be an article in the local paper. 126

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128 Chairman Le Doux suggested obtaining the value of this piece, as well as any other donation pieces, in order to 129 provide receipts to donors that that request it for tax purposes. The location of where the sleigh will be 130 displayed is undetermined at this time.

## 132 NEW / OLD BUSINESS

## 1. Deborah Padykula, Finance Officer

## a. 1<sup>st</sup> Quarter Financial Review

135 Deborah Padykula, Finance Officer provided a financial review of the Town's budget, stating that expenditures 136 through March 2018 are 25% expended. The DPW overtime account is 75% expended due to snow removal 137 from the beginning of the year. Last year about the same amount was spent at this time. Some of the overtime 138 accounts have been trending higher due to two open positions with the Police Department and one open position 139 with the Communications Department. All three positions will be filled by the end of the month.

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141 It was stated that most revenue accounts are on track, with 19% collected to date, except for New Hampshire

meals and rooms tax, which is received at the end of the year. Also, the Highway Block Grants, which are

143 received on a quarterly basis. Interest is collecting at a higher rate than expected. The town received almost

144 \$25,000 in interest from money market accounts and CD's. Motor Vehicle registrations are on track at 25%

145 collected.146

147 D. Padykula received five quotes for leasing with the option to purchase, four new 2018 Ford Utility

148 Interceptors for the Police Department and one new 2018 Sutphan Fire Rescue Truck for the Fire Department. 149 There are two separate agreements, one for the police cruisers and one for the fire truck. All American 150 Investment Group, LLC had the lowest rates, coming in at 3.07% for the police cruisers and 3.17% for the fire 151 rescue truck.

> MOVED by Peter Band, seconded by Frank Cadwell that the Selectmen authorize Deborah Padykula, Finance Officer to enter into a Lease with Option to Purchase Agreement on behalf of the Town of Hollis, with All American Investment Group, LLC for four police cruisers and one fire rescue truck and to sign any paperwork pertaining to the lease agreement. Voting in favor of the motion were Le Doux, Cadwell, Band and Petry. No one was opposed. The motion PASSED 4-0-0.

#### 2. Selectmen Department and Committee Assignments
