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- 16 Chairman Le Doux provided an update on the health status of Dr. Manoukian, stating that the surgery
- 17 went well and the doctors believe that all of the cancerous tumor was removed. He will undergo
- 18 chemotherapy and radiation as a preventative measure. He remains in good spirits and appreciates the
- 19 support from the community.20

21 **MEETING**

1. Constitution Week Proclamation

The Board of Selectmen proclaimed the week of September 17th through September 23rd as Constitution Week. Mary Lou Ward and members of the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) were in attendance and presented the Board with a copy of the Declaration of Independence. This year marks the two hundred and twenty-ninth anniversary of the signing of the United States of America Constitution.

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Dr. Manoukian unexpectedly joined the meeting to say hello and was included in the group picture. Dr. Manoukian explained his health situation leading up to his prognosis as well as his recovery since the surgery. He expressed his gratitude and appreciation to the community and to Christopher Stone, a close friend and colleague, for covering the day to day operations of the pharmacy, during Dr. Manoukian's

2. Legislative Update

State Representatives James Belanger, Carolyn Gargasz and Keith Ammon reported on House and Senate
Bills that passed legislation. A synopsis was distributed summarizing the bills that specifically pertain to
the Board and/or the Town of Hollis. The following House Bills were reviewed: 1198, 331, 527, 1418,

38 1419, 1219, 1181, 1202, 1353, 1395, 285, 606, 1584, and 430. The following Senate Bills were

reviewed: 146, 411, and 482. It was noted that 2 million dollars in grant funding is available for town's
 to assist law enforcement in addressing the opioid crisis targeting drug dealers and traffickers.

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42 Chairman Le Doux expressed his concern with the financial crisis pertaining to the state retirement

- program and requested a meeting with additional state and federal representatives in Concord to voicethose concerns on behalf of the Town of Hollis.
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46 Selectman Cadwell requested assistance from Mr. Belanger regarding the National Pollution Discharge

- 47 Elimination System (NPDES) Federal Storm Water Program since it will greatly affect the budget for the
- 48 Town of Hollis. He is concerned with the increased costs, such as consulting fees, associated with the
- 49 program that would be mandated by the Federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). The costs

would consume over 1% of the Town's budget. It was questioned whether the Town of Hollis shouldcomply with the federal mandate or not.

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3. Town Moderator, Election Discussion

54 The itinerary for the State Primary and General Election was discussed in detail. The selectmen will 55 provide a schedule of attendance for the State Primary Election on September 13, 2016 from 7am-7pm as 56 well as the General Election on November 8, 2016 from 7am-7pm. Both elections will take place at the 57 Hollis Brookline High School. Three selectmen and/or designees are required to be present during the 58 duration of both elections.

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4. Agricultural Commission / Conservation Commission Working Group

61 Chairman Mark Post and commission member, Dan Harmon of the Hollis Agricultural Commission 62 presented the Board with an outline of a proposed 'Working Group' approach for leasing of Stefanowicz 63 Agricultural Land. This approach would include two people from the Agricultural Commission, two 64 people from the Conservation Commission, one person from Town Hall and one Selectmen 65 representative. The purpose would be to manage the overall process for leasing segment(s) of the 66 Stefanowicz property for agricultural use, with emphasis on transparency and impartiality.

68 Certain tasks include use assessments, inventory for property segment(s), bid process, negotiating lease

69 terms and requesting and monitoring activities by other organizations. Selectman Cadwell questioned

- why the Recreation Commission was not part of the working group membership. It was stated that the
- 71 Agricultural Commission was strictly looking at the agricultural parts of the land at this time. The
- 72 Conservation Commission has been in contact with the Recreation Commission to scope out parts of the

73 property that would be available for possible recreational use. The working group would make 74 recommendations to the Agricultural and Conservation Commission and would not be a separate

- 74 recommendations to the Agricultural and Conservation Commission and would not be a separate 75 committee or commission. The approach needs to be objective and the memberships should relate to that

79 Mr. Post discussed the topic of enforcing terms of leases. There are several responsibilities of the Leaser,

- 80 including inspections, collecting taxes/rent and addressing repairs and/or maintenance. Selectman Petry
- 81 suggested drafting a lease document with the terms of the lease to accompany the bid opposed to
- 82 obtaining the lease and negotiating the terms after the fact.
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Mark Post stated that a warrant article would be needed to engage in a lease that would cover 2018
because it will be a multi-year lease. The Board will take the suggestion under advisement and ask
Counsel.

Mark Post asked the Board what will happen to the land next summer since there is currently a farmer
leasing the land. Chairman Le Doux stated that the Town has not purchased the land yet and if something
were to come up between now and then the Board would possibly create an Interim Agreement. The land
will be purchased Fee Simple which means no encumbrances or leases.
