M. Le Doux opened the Public Hearing. K. Galipeau confirmed that Hollis Community Organizations meeting on a regular basis, will continue to have the option of meeting once per month, at no charge.

T. Dufresne added that he has a signed application for the Planning Board to review this plan, which includes a traffic study administered by traffic experts. Although the Recreation Commission is a town entity, they will
 follow through with the application, including any conditions, to the fullest extent. T. Dufresne added that there
 will be additional opportunities for public comments throughout the Planning Board.

J. Brooks commented that people living in Brookline would be more inclined to use Witches Spring Road oppose to Route 101A, so she is concerned with traffic on Witches Spring. She felt that the amount of accidents reflected in the presentation was not accurate, since some accidents may not have been reported properly. The rural character of that area is already deemed agricultural and residential and she would like it to remain that way.

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She questioned whether the property between Depot Road and the Hollis Brookline High School would be an option for recreation fields. D. Belanger explained that although the Town owns the property, the deed restrictions are so great that it could not be a viable option for recreation fields. She also inquired about the field by the south side of the driveway, near the Hollis Brookline High School. D. Belanger responded that there is a well, wetland, conservation easements and the property is owned by the school, so it would not be an option either. J. Brooks supports the use for conservation and agricultural and does not support the use for recreational fields for the Siergiewicz property.

123 Carryl Roy, 258 South Merrimack Road asked where the port-a-pottys would be located. D. Belanger explained 124 that they would not be in the parking lot, but off to the side near the barn. He added that they are cleaned at 125 least once a week and the number of units needed would be what is deemed appropriate. There are currently 126 two between the Hardy Fields. C. Roy asked if there are any restrictions for the chemicals used to maintenance 127 the port-a-pottys, in case there is a leak. D. Belanger responded that the Recreation Commission will do 128 whatever the best practice requires, whether it is a cement slab under the units, etc. C. Roy felt that any and all 129 restrictions as well as allowable uses for the property that have been discussed, such as no lighting or PA 130 systems should be included in an agreement.

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M. Le Doux stated that once the Selectmen review the purchase and sale agreement, if deemed appropriate, it will be posted on the website. He clarified that the Board of Selectmen and Planning Board implement any restrictions and/or allowed uses on the property. The residents are voting to give the Board of Selectmen authorization to work with supporting organizations such as Recreation Commission, Conservation Commission, Agricultural Commission, Highway Safety Committee, Planning Board and Town Counsel to

- 137 come up with the best practice analysis and solutions for the property, if the taxpayers pass the Warrant Article.

- D. Belanger explained the agricultural restrictions on the Stefanowicz property, such as the 500 foot buffer.
- LeeAnn Wolf, 3 Taylors Way commented that she felt due diligence has been followed and is convinced of the need for athletic fields and that the town has explored all options for obtaining fields and encouraged the town to continue open dialog with the residents to mitigate their concerns.
