10 PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

11 The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

13 PUBLIC COMMENT

Kent Blumenshine (Rideout Road) commented on RSA 159:26 as it relates to the proposed petition warrant
 article. His group reviewed the proposed language, but could not come to a compromise to change it. He is not
 in support for the petition warrant article.

Dave Werner (Ridge Rd) explained that he saw a similar movement happen in California as the laws slowly removed his rights to have firearms. He is concerned that this will happen in Hollis. He commented that the constitution states that one has the right to bear arms. It is constitutionally protected for one to have a weapon for self-defense. In his opinion self-defense includes the ability to target practice, although that term is not used in the language. His point is that one cannot effectively define oneself if one doesn't know how to operate a firearm correctly and the only way to operate a firearm correctly is to shoot it. He felt he has the right to discharge a firearm so he can properly defend himself.

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Michelle St. John (Orchard Dr) commented that since the public lands in Hollis have such varied uses, the town
 should look at all town property to determine if there is a piece of land that could be designated for target
 practice in hopes to have a desirable solution for everyone.

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Kat McGhee (Hayden Rd) felt that the intention of section 644 is to not take firearms away from people nor is it saying that people are not allowed to target practice, but states that there are rules around the places and locations where firearm discharging is not allowed because it poses a safety hazard. She added that this particular statute reflected unauthorized use of firearms in places where it is not. She didn't think anyone was oppose to people owning firearms. She commented that she was not entirely familiar with all of the laws and ordinances surrounding firearms.

37 Doug Davidson (Rideout Rd) felt that the legislation currently at the state house is the first step towards the 38 removal of ones rights to own and operate firearms. He was discouraged that people in the positions of 39 initiating and passing laws and legislations are ill informed about the laws for firearms and firearm safety. He 40 explained that hunting season is in fact 365 days a year and 24 hours a day. People don't just hunt during 41 specific seasons, like deer season. He is concerned with the lack of knowledge, comparing RSA 31:39 to RSA 42 159:26. Although the two laws deals with similar matters, they are not the same and are not related. RSA 31:39 43 does not say anything about shooting or firearms or anything related to conservation land or forests. There is no 44 authority under that article that supersedes paragraph I of 159:26. He felt that quoting a law that is relevant to a 45 topic, but doesn't state the topic anywhere in the law is absurd, in his opinion. He invited the legislators to talk 46 to those people that are knowledgeable about those matters before drafting or making recommendations on 47 legislation.

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Mike Werner (Ridge Rd) saw in incremental approached to what is going on. He is unclear on the validity on what is being proposed. He felt that one needs to train to be competent and felt it would be non-sensible to remove the aspect of training. He felt there should be a compromise, without infringing on one's rights. In his opinion he felt one's rights were slowly being taken away.

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54 Joe Garubba (Winchester Dr) spoke about House Bill 1629, which is a bill about training for land use board 55 members, such as zoning and planning. In his opinion the bill goes beyond just training. His concerns about the 56 amendment to the bill include the lack of ability as a town to manage local zoning issues. The bill was amended 57 and is currently in the senate. The density for housing for older persons is now going to apply to workforce 58 housing throughout the town, regardless of what is in our zoning ordinance. The bill removes the Select Board's 59 authority to extend the planning boards deadlines and remove the ability to interpret the zoning ordinance by 60 identifying in writing which violations a development may present when it gets denied. M. Le Doux stated that 61 the board discussed the bill and does not support it. J. Garubba asked the Select Board to testify against the bill.

6263 APPOINTMENT

MOVED by Peter Band seconded by Susan Benz that the Select Board appoint James Plummer as an alternate
member of the Conservation Commission, with a term expiration date of 4/30/2023. Voting in favor of the
motion were Le Doux, Petry, Benz, Band and Cadwell. No one was opposed. The motion PASSED 5-0-0.

6768 DISCUSSION WITH STATE LEGISLATORS

Senator Melanie Levesque, Representative Michelle St. John and Representative Kat McGhee (via
 teleconference) briefed the Select Board on several house and senate bills. Discussion ensued and can be
 viewed via the Town Hall Streams through the town website at www.hollisnh.org, meeting videos.

73 NEW BUSINESS

74 Congregational Church of Hollis-Sidewalk (Tom Hildreth)

75 The church's pending renovation project will eliminate the diagonal sidewalk across the east lawn. The 76 sidewalk dates back to 1923, predating the conveyance of the real estate from the Town to the church in 1925. 77 While the church will not prevent the public from crossing its property, the community patio to be added to the 78 east lawn will eliminate the natural path of cutting the Broad Street/Monument Square corner across the church 79 lawn. The church would like to discuss options to extent the public sidewalk from its current terminus on Broad 80 Street to the intersection with Monument Square. DPW provided a cost estimate to construct a 5'wide sidewalk 81 at 100' to be roughly \$4,500. The church is requesting the town pay for the cost to construct a new sidewalk 82 since it is a public sidewalk in the public Right of Way and benefits public safety. The church will be 83 responsible for the construction of the sidewalk to align with the project and the town will contribute the funds 84 for the construction.

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MOVED by David Petry seconded by Peter Band that the Select Board authorize the expenditure of not more
than \$5,000 from the Road Maintenance fund in DPW's budget for the construction of a public sidewalk
alongside of the Congregational Church of Hollis property and Depot Road and to sign any pertinent
paperwork related to the ongoing maintenance of the sidewalk. Voting in favor of the motion were Le Doux,
Petry, Benz, Band and Cadwell. No one was opposed. The motion PASSED 5-0-0.

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92 Bid Approval-Grounds Maintenance for town facilities (Todd Croteau)

93 DPW Director T. Croteau reviewed the vendors that submitted sealed bids for the Town Ground Maintenance

- 94 and Town Recreation Field Maintenance Request for Proposals. The low bid was submitted by NH
- 95 Greenscapes in the amount of \$40,154. The bid represents a reduction of approximately \$5,000 per year from
- 96 what the town has paid over the last five growing seasons. Funds for this service are budgeted in the

- 97 Maintenance Ground account in the budget. D. Petry would like assurance that the contract includes an
- Assignment Clause and a Nonperformance Clause, to protect the town. T. Croteau will provide the Board with
 a copy of the current contract, for their review.
